Ensuring Responsible Spending of Recovery Act Funds

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation's infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities is available to grantees, the Department strongly suggests that grantees incorporate consideration of the public perception of the intent of the Recovery Act in identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

Activity Name: Minnesota Shubert Performing Arts & Education Center

<u>Activity Narrative</u>: Rehabilitation of the Shubert Theater supports the CDBG performance measure to expand economic opportunities. There will be 48 permanent full-time jobs and 101 construction jobs generated by this project. Of the 48 permanent jobs, 38 will be at Minnesota Shubert and 10 from core Shubert partners. Shubert will enter into agreements with three local workforce organizations to identify, review, and develop job candidates from low-income neighborhoods in Minneapolis to fill 38 jobs that have low barriers to entry (ushers, ticket staff). The CDBG-R investment will permit this project to start by fall 2009 by providing the final gap funding to project. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Jobs Benefit. The project meets the Recovery Act criteria of preserving and creating jobs and promoting economic recovery, and Investing in infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits.

(Additional Recovery Funds to be applied for: Economic Development Administration Public Works and Economic Development Facilities Program grant)

<u>Jobs Created</u>: 43 new full-time permanent FTE jobs, 5 retained FTE jobs and 101 construction jobs created.

<u>Additional Activity Information</u>: This project will conserve a historic building and use green building features such as energy efficient electrical and mechanical systems, green interior materials, and a white-coated roofing membrane to reduce urban "heat island" effect. The building's adjacent location and pedestrian connections to a light rail transit station promote transit oriented development and smart growth.

Activity Name: Lead Hazard Reduction

<u>Activity Narrative</u>: CDBG-R funds will make residential units lead safe that would otherwise remain a lead hazard. Making residential units lead safe supports the CDBG performance measures to provide decent housing and suitable living environments. This project will replace windows in the Phillips, Central and Powderhorn neighborhoods (all within CDBG target areas). There will be 3 construction jobs involved in project. These positions will consist of recalled laid-off workers. Three Sentence to Serve (STS) individuals will be trained as journeymen carpenters to work on the properties. STS is a work release from prison program that trains individuals as union journeymen carpenters. The funding will provide a local match to a HUD Lead Hazard Control Grant of \$3 million which has been difficult to raise in the current economic environment for low-income property owners. The project can be implemented immediately. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Housing. The project addresses the Recovery Act criteria of Assisting those most impacted by the recession, and Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term benefits.

Jobs Created: 3 construction jobs retained.

<u>Additional Activity Information</u>: The replacement windows are energy star rated and locally manufactured. The work will further reduce the incidence of lead hazards in Minneapolis housing stock.

Activity Name: TenKsolar Manufacturing Facility

Activity Narrative: TenKsolar is poised to manufacture a new generation of high-tech and lowcost solar panels -- creating new, well-paying "green" manufacturing jobs in a low-income community in Minneapolis, stimulating the local economy, and addressing climate change by expanding the market for clean, renewable energy. This project supports the CDBG performance measure of expanding economic opportunities. TenKsolar will launch a full-scale solar panel production operation in 2009-10 that will create over 100 manufacturing, sales and R&D jobs by mid-2010 and a total of 360 jobs by 2011. Approximately seventy percent of the 360 jobs will be in manufacturing (252 jobs). The manufacturing jobs will need to be offered first to Minneapolis low and moderate-income residents as a condition of the CDBG-R assistance. 30 construction jobs are anticipated with this project. The project is working with City development staff on site selection and anticipates being able to begin rehabilitation/redevelopment by end of 2009. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Jobs Benefit. This project addresses the Recovery Act criteria of Preserving and creating jobs and promoting economic recovery; Providing investment needed to increase economic efficiency; Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits; and Fostering energy independence.

Jobs Created: 360 full-time jobs and 30 construction jobs created.

Activity Name: Van White Memorial Boulevard Roadway & Bridge Construction

Activity Narrative: While one focus of the Heritage Park redevelopment is construction of mixed-income housing, the Hollman vs. Cisneros Consent Decree also called for major transportation work to connect isolated communities to the broader Minneapolis community. The CDBG-R funding will assist in the completion of the Van White Memorial Bridge and Roadway project supporting the CDBG performance measures of providing a suitable living environment and expansion of economic opportunities. This project is an integral element of the \$225 million Heritage Park redevelopment project. The boulevard's construction is the most significant strategy at ending the isolation and economic hardship experienced by Minneapolis' Near Northside residents. The boulevard will be a catalyst in preserving construction jobs, removing stigmatization to Near Northside development, cleaning up century-old pollution contamination, attracting businesses, and enhancing green space opportunities. Its construction will spur private investment and allow easy access to jobs, schools, and cultural activities throughout the City. This project work is scheduled for a construction start at end of Summer 2009. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Area Benefit. The project addresses the Recovery Act by Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits.

Jobs Created: 300 construction jobs are anticipated to be created with this work.

<u>Additional Activity Information</u>: This project will promote smart growth by connecting a once isolated community to the entire Minneapolis community.

Activity Name: Fire Station 20 Reroofing

<u>Activity Narrative</u>: Fire Station 20 is in need of a new roof. CDBG-R funding provides an opportunity to provide one-time assistance to undertake this project. The reroofing project meets the CDBG performance measure of providing a suitable living environment. The project will use a white roof/membrane design that will maximize energy savings while providing a responsible long-term roofing solution. This building is well suited for this type of roof. This project is part of the City of Minneapolis Property Services' work plan and can be implemented immediately. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Area Benefit. The project addresses the Recovery Act criteria of Providing investment needed to increase economic efficiency; Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits; and Fostering energy independence.

Jobs Created: 2 construction jobs created.

<u>Additional Activity Information</u>: Green building technologies will be used - a white roof/membrane design that will maximize energy savings while providing a responsible long-term roofing solution. This will also result in energy conservation. The project is part of a wider City of Minneapolis plan for retrofitting municipal buildings for energy efficiency and conservation.

Activity Name: Chicago Avenue Fire Arts Center

<u>Activity Narrative</u>: To finance construction costs for renovation and build-out of an arts education, studio, and gallery space. The project serves the CDBG performance measures around expansion of economic opportunities and provision of suitable living environment. The project is proposed for a vacant building at the 38th and Chicago Commercial Node. The CDBG-R investment will permit this project to start by fall 2009, providing additional gap funding to finance the project. This project will likely being in 2009. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Area Benefit. The project meets the Recovery Act criteria of Preserving and creating jobs and promoting economic recovery, and Investing in infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits.

<u>Jobs Created</u>: 2 full-time jobs, 15 part-time jobs and 30 construction jobs created. The approximately 15 part-time jobs will be instructors working roughly 4 hours per week.

<u>Additional Activity Information</u>: Energy conservation will be maximized through (1) renovation of an existing building, (2) use of recovered fixtures and materials, (3) energy efficient doors, windows, and water heater, and (4) future use of the building for arts practices that recycle existing materials into new forms.

Activity Name: Winterization of Condemned/Boarded Properties

<u>Activity Narrative</u>: To winterize condemned and boarded properties in the City of Minneapolis Vacant Building Registration Program. Winterization will include draining of plumbing pipes, preparation of water based heating systems, disconnect of City water service, electric and gas utilities and properly re-securing premises. This project meets the CDBG performance measure of sustainability of affordable housing. This work will address immediate safety hazards to these private, disinvested properties and seek to preserve structural integrity for future reinvestment. In effect, the winterization activities will permit the house to retain value for potential rehabilitation and preserve the housing stock. Approximately 4-5 new trade jobs in the private sector will be created due to this project. The project could start immediately upon receipt of CDBG-R funding. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Area Benefit. The project addresses the Recovery Act by Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits.

Jobs Created: 4 full-time jobs created.

<u>Additional Activity Information</u>: This project can assist in reducing pollution and resource conservation by preventing water pipes from breaking - leading to water loss and damaged property. The winterization work also assists in keeping residential properties sustainable for future reinvestment.

Activity Name: Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches HandyWorks

<u>Activity Narrative</u>: This project assists low-income and vulnerable seniors 65 and older in Minneapolis to remain independent in their own homes by providing minor home repairs and other home maintenance chores. These services meet the CDBG performance measure of sustainability of suitable living environments. One full-time equivalent intermittent staff primarily for outdoor work, plus volunteers, providing 2,630 hours of service will deliver these services to 225 eligible clients annually. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Income (Limited Clientele). The project addresses the Recovery Act criteria of Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits, and Assisting those most impacted by the recession.

Jobs Created: 1 full-time job retained for intermittent work

<u>Additional Activity Information</u>: Although the primary goal is to retain senior citizens living safely in their own homes the project will also promote energy conservation and reduced pollution through well maintained properties.

Activity Name: Minneapolis Housing Services

<u>Activity Narrative</u>: To assist low-income residents impacted by the economy, primarily foreclosure and related housing services (utilities, repairs, general tenant rights and responsibilities). The CDBG performance measures of affordability and availability of housing is served by this project. Two Housing Service Advocates will provide critical crisis housing advice and referrals to an average of 1,000 Minneapolis residents/month. 2 permanent jobs will be retained. This project meets the CDBG-R national objective of Low/Mod Income (Limited Clientele). The project addresses the Recovery Act criteria of Assisting those most impacted by the recession, and Minimizing or avoiding reductions in essential services.

CERTIFICATIONS

(1) Affirmatively furthering fair housing. The jurisdiction will affirmatively further fair housing, which means that it will conduct an analysis to identify impediments to fair housing choice within the jurisdiction, take appropriate actions to overcome the effects of any impediments identified through that analysis, and maintain records reflecting the analysis and actions in this regard.

(2) Anti-displacement and relocation plan. The jurisdiction will comply with the acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended (42 U.S.C. 4601), and implementing regulations at 49 CFR part 24; and it has in effect and is following a residential anti-displacement and relocation assistance plan required under section 104(d) of the housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, in connection with any activity assisted with funding under CDBG-R.

(4) Anti-lobbying. To the best of the jurisdiction's knowledge and belief:

1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of it, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement;

2. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, it will complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions; and

3. It will require that the language of paragraph 1 and 2 of this anti-lobbying certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

(5) Authority of Jurisdiction. The jurisdiction possesses the legal authority to carry out the programs for which it is seeking funding, in accordance with applicable HUD regulations and other program requirements.
