		According to Complainant, an officer in an unmarked squad car was behind him and at a stop light. While at the light and just prior to it turning green, Complainant claims that the officer turned on his lights, but not his sirens, and proceeded to drive to the right of Complainant's vehicle. Upon turning around Complainant's vehicle, Complainant contends that the officer attempted to make a U-turn, effectively cutting off Complainant's vehicle and another person next him. According to Complainant, the officer's lights were not visible when his car was perpendicular to the road, thus giving the appearance to the driver next to him that someone was cutting him off. Making matters worse, Complainant claims that the light for which they were stopped at turned green as the officer was doing this.
		During the officer's attempted U-turn, Complainant claims that the driver next to him
		honked and the officer responded by stopping his car and yelling at the driver.
