Blueprint for Equitable Engagement: One Minneapolis Fund Results in **Changes for Neighborhoods**

At a number of recent annual meetings, neighborhood organizations saw a resurgence of interest in their work with a number of new people getting elected to their board of directors. The Lao Assistance Center and Pillsbury's Waite House, both funded by the One Minneapolis Fund, were instrumental with creating connections between the SE Asian and Latino communities with several



neighborhood organizations. Midtown Phillips, East Phillips, Nokomis East and Shingle Creek neighborhoods all saw changes as a result of this work.

In south Minneapolis, Waite House worked closely with the Latino community on outreach and leadership development. Organizing included building an understanding of how neighborhood organizations work. Waite House worked collaboratively with the neighborhood to support the new residents in leadership roles. The Lao Assistance Center did similar work in north Minneapolis with the Southeast Asian community. In addition to building new relationships between neighborhoods and cultural communities, a total of nine new neighborhood organization board members were elected as a result of this effort.

The One Minneapolis Fund is a new program specifically designed to support leadership development within cultural communities and support connections with the City's engagement work, including neighborhood organizations. Last year, 2013, was the first year of this program.

The One Minneapolis Fund is part of a broader, multi-year strategic action plan to ensure an equitable community engagement system for the City known as the Blueprint for Equitable Engagement (formally known as the Blueprint for Equity). NCR and the Neighborhood and Community Engagement Commission (NCEC) are working together to ensure that City's engagement efforts are equitable in their approach and reflective of the people of Minneapolis.

The Blueprint focuses specifically on tools and strategies for: 1) Neighborhood organizations; 2) City advisory boards and commissions; and 3) City department engagement. For more information, please visit the Blueprint for Equitable Engagement webpage:

Neighborhood Stories: Como Green Village



Since November, when Southeast Como neighbors were contacted by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) about trichloroethylene (TCE) vapor intrusion related to an old General Mills site, the Southeast Como Improvement Association (SECIA) has been busy meeting with industry staff and government officials and getting information out to area residents.

While this issue has consumed hundreds of hours of volunteer and staff time, SECIA is uniquely positioned to address the problem. Since its inception, the organization has undertaken a variety of environmental initiatives, including air quality programs, tree planting, opening new community gardens, organic lawn care, clothesline give-aways, building rain barrels and GrowBarrelsTM, and a Solar Pilot Project. Environmental awareness has also been a driving force behind SECIA's novel program, MIMO — a Move-In/Move-Out Neighborhood Free Store - geared for the neighborhood's student

population and aimed at reducing waste. And, the Como Green Village initiative and companion website promote activities focused on sustainability - most recently, two new bike repair stations (pictured) installed just last week. For more information, visit www.secomo.org.

Spring street sweeping has begun

An annual rite of spring in Minneapolis began Tuesday, April 22. That's when Public Works crews started a comprehensive sweeping of all city streets to clean up the dirt and grime the melting ice and snow leaves behind. Beginning Monday April 21, drivers should watch for temporary "No Parking" signs along these streets to avoid a ticket and tow.

From April 22 through May 16, sweepers will take care of all 1,000 miles of city streets. To make sure the crews can do the best job possible, temporary "No Parking" signs will be posted at least 24 hours in advance to make sure streets are clear of parked vehicles. Residents need to follow street sweep parking rules or they may have their cars ticketed and towed to the Minneapolis Impound Lot.

On Friday, April 25th the Minneapolis City Council and Mayor Betsy Hodges unanimously approved a resolution that will recognize the second Monday in October as Indigenous Peoples Day in Minneapolis, beginning this year.

Along with the federal government, Minneapolis has for many years recognized the second Monday in October as Columbus Day. The resolution recognizes the day as Indigenous Peoples Day, marking and celebrating the significance of the American Indian and Indigenous community in Minneapolis, as well as the city's history of American Indian activism.

As part of the resolution, the City of Minneapolis also encourages other businesses, organizations and public entities to recognize Indigenous Peoples Day.

State of the City address calls for growth and equity in a well-run city

In her first State of the City address, Minneapolis Mayor Betsy Hodges made the case for inclusive growth, where all


residents contribute to and share in growth and prosperity.


Three questions guide decision-making

Ensuring that the City runs well is one of Mayor Hodges' key priorities. When considering proposed policies and initiatives, the mayor told the audience that she uses three questions to guide her decisions:

- How will this make the City run well?
- How will this move the dial on equity?
- How will this move the dial on growth?

Hodges explained that these three questions are inextricably linked. "If we do not run the City well, it is not possible to meet any of the other goals we have for ourselves as a people and as a City. And if not





Mayor Hodges highlighted a number of efforts that are moving or will move the City toward these goals, including:

- Moving the dial on running the City well
- Moving the dial on equity
- Moving the dial on growing the city

It's time to brag

Mayor Hodges ended her speech by announcing the "Best Week of Bragging in Minneapolis Ever." Noting that Minneapolis' growth is held back by its residents' "militantly modest" characteristics, Hodges told the audience that Minneapolis can't afford to be modest if it wants to grow and bring new opportunities here. The week of bragging — set for July 14-20 — will feature "best of" lists and events meant to encourage bragging.
