Neighborhood Stories: Glendale Housing Fair

On Saturday May 3rd, Prospect Park East River Road Improvement Association (PPERRIA) hosted a housing and community resource fair at Luxton Park Recreation Center. The event was well attended and many Glendale townhome residents came with their families. PPERRIA's Outreach Task Force hopes to forge a better connection between Glendale residents and the greater Prospect Park Neighborhood. The housing fair was a great start to reviving that connection and building a link to the townhome residents.

PPERRIA and the City of Minneapolis provided translation services in Somali and Hmong so that residents could participate in priority planning activities and talk with various agencies. The top priorities for Glendale residents fell into the areas of Health and Safety and Childcare and Recreation



Opportunities. Residents expressed need for larger and more modern units and assistance in understanding One-Sort recycling. There was also a large interest in the Own-A-Home Minneapolis program. The joint Task Force that organized the Resource Fair will be continuing their work to strengthen community relations between the two parts of the neighborhood.

Housing and Information was provided by: Minneapolis Public Housing Authority (MPHA), Metro Transit (Central Corridor Office), East African Development Services, Minneapolis Park and Recreation, Minneapolis Solid Waste and Recycling, Minneapolis Fire Dept. and more. The event was co-hosted by PPERRIA, City of Minneapolis Neighborhood and Community Relations, Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board, and East side Neighborhood Services.

Attend the National Lao-Hmong Recognition Day Celebration on July 22nd

This day honors the Hmong-Lao American Veterans for their warrior tradition, loyalty, and bravery during the Vietnam War. Beginning in 1960, the U.S. recruited thousands of Lao-Hmong to fight against communist expansion in Laos in place of U.S. ground troops: Veterans engaged in direct combat with communist troops, flew thousands of deadly combat missions in support of the U.S. efforts in Southeast Asia, disrupted the flow of communist troops and war supplies along the Ho Chi Minh Trail to fight U.S. troops in South Vietnam; protected U.S. personnel and Air Force radar installation, and collected critical military intelligence for U.S. missions against North Vietnam.

July 22, 2014 - St. Paul, Minnesota at 10:00am: The Hmong community will host a parade from the Woodland Hill Church to the General Vang Community Center on 1600 White Bear Avenue to celebrate the National Lao-Hmong Recognition Day.

Absentee voting begins for August 12 primary

The City has begun accepting absentee ballots for the August 12, 2014 primary. Contests on the ballot in Minneapolis include federal, state, county, school board, and judicial offices. All Minneapolis voters are encouraged to vote in the primary and make their voice heard in selecting who will be the ballot in the November general election.

This is the first time voters won't be required to provide a specific reason for not voting on primary day. That makes absentee voting available to all voters. Absentee voting for the Primary opened Friday, June 27 at the Minneapolis Office of Elections & Voter Services, 350 Fifth St. S. – Room 201.



Voters can choose to vote absentee either by mail or in person. City Hall has transformed into Minneapolis' largest polling place, open to all voters who want to come in to cast their absentee ballot in person. The Elections & Voter Services team has readied their office in room 201 to accommodate voters. They've also transitioned in-person absentee voting into the larger rotunda area of City Hall whenever high turnout requires more room.

Protect your property: register your bicycle with police



Every year, thousands of bikes are lost or stolen in Minneapolis and many of them are actually recovered. However, because of a lack of proper identification, only a small percentage are ever returned to their owners.

To help increase the chances that your stolen bike will be returned, you can now register your bicycle with the Minneapolis Police Department. You can register online, call 311, or use 311's phone app.

To register your bike, you will need to include your bike's serial number, a description of the bike-make and model--and your contact information.

45 Day Review and Comment Period for Community Innovation Fund

The Community Innovation Fund is intended to provide grants to neighborhood organizations to foster innovative and locally-relevant approaches to City-identified goals. Scheduled to begin in early 2015, the program will make \$300,000 available in grants to neighborhoods for a two-year period.



The draft guidelines were developed by the <u>Neighborhood and Community Engagement Commission</u> (NCEC) after a series of nine listening sessions with neighborhood organizations held in early 2014.
