Requested Action:

1. Approve the funding recommendations from the One Minneapolis Fund Committee for submission to the City Council for final approval.

Background:

The One Minneapolis Fund was initiated in 2013 to provide grants to organizations serving cultural communities in Minneapolis for programs involving leadership development and broadening community engagement efforts. Of the designated \$182,000 in funding.

Group A Funding: Community or Cultural organizations should submit proposals for projects that develop and prepare leaders to serve on City boards and commissions and on one of Minneapolis' 70 neighborhood organization boards.

Organizations that serve communities of color and renters are highly encouraged to apply for this funding group.

Group A proposals may request a maximum of \$15,000. Organizations may submit one proposal. Multiple organizations will be selected for this funding group.

Group B Funding: Community or Cultural organizations should submit proposals for projects that that connect diverse residents to the City and engage communities, beyond neighborhood boarders, in specific targeted audiences. These programs may be either established and ongoing programs or new programs.

Group B proposals may request a maximum of \$25,000. Organizations may submit one proposal. Multiple organizations will be selected for this funding group.

A total of 38 eligible proposals were received by the October 10th deadline with \$879,978 in funding requests, proposing to serve all of the targeted audiences listed in the RFP, plus the LGBTQA+, transgender and homeless youth communities. The One Minneapolis Fund Committee meet on Friday, October 19th to select proposals to be recommended for funding.

HACER (A): HACER will conduct leadership training workshops to advance the inclusion of, and equity for, Latinos in Minneapolis. This will be accomplished by providing Latinos with the skills, knowledge, and confidence they need to join neighborhood associations, City of Minneapolis advisory boards, and City of Minneapolis Commissions, as well as applying for positions with the City of Minneapolis that influence policy.

Little Earth Residents Association (A): This proposal will train and develop residents of the Little Earth community and surrounding East Phillips neighborhood to serve on neighborhood association boards and City of Minneapolis boards and commissions.

One Family One Community (A): One Family One Community will train low-income renters and northside residents to serve on City Boards and Commissions and Neighborhood Association boards. Additionally, the project seeks to engage these residents to attend other City programs such as the City Academy and the Community Connections Conference.

Heritage Youth Sports Foundation (B): The Athleadership 2.0 program will train Minneapolis high school student athletes the opportunity to serve as peer educators, teaching Minneapolis youth, ages 5-14, the

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Discovery of Self (DoS) curriculum, a Social-Emotional intelligence program which inspires young people to develop a new, positive mindset.

Bridge for Youth (B): The Youth Leadership Development Project will allow youth in The Bridge for Youth's intentional community, Rita's House, to participate in activities that empower them, while also fostering connection to the greater community. Through relevant training, skills development, and leadership opportunities, youth will develop a greater sense and understanding of their vital role in the Minneapolis community.

Inquilinxs Unidxs por Justicia (B): The project is to build a People's Institute, starting with the initiation of two parts of a training, in conjunction with, CTUL (Centro de Trabajadores Unidos en Lucha). The first part of the training will be a basic one-day training around worldview and personal barriers to organizing. The second will be a four-week training, focusing on skills needed to organize with your neighbors or coworkers.

Lake Street Council (B): With this project, small business owners of color and immigrant entrepreneurs will work with City of Minneapolis departments and elected officials to reduce racial disparities in business ownership. The Project will bring entrepreneurs and City representatives together to develop policy and programs to reduce these barriers.

Minnesota Transgender Health Coalition (B): TRANSit project will work with a network of Transgender artists, activists, athletes and academics who are people of color who will support each other in leadership development and community engagement in the City of Minneapolis.

RECLAIM (B): This project will execute an art's leadership development program called "Art Heals." The program serves gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, questioning youth and their allies. The project will link LGBTQ+ youth to community artist at all levels and genres to create community connections with mentorship and will culminates in an evening of community celebration of healing through art.

The SEAD Project (B): The SEAD Project will work with SE Asian youth through a leadership development program for students to have the opportunity to explore, reflect, and process their identities and spaces as Southeast Asian youth in today's society.
