Updates and Headlines (Minneapolis Employment & Training Reports)

Teresa Harrold

- Teresa passed out the Program Year (PY) 2014 WIA Youth Performance Measures for the 16 Workforce Service Areas (WSAs) that were finalized by DEED on August 7, 2015.
 - o WSAs need to achieve at least 80% on five of the seven performance measures or can receive sanctions.
 - The City of Minneapolis Employment and Training met or exceeded all seven PY'2014 performance measures. (See attached PDF).
- Minneapolis Employment and Training recommendation for 2014 Youth Employment Partner of the Year is HIRED (see attachment).
 - A motion was made by Tyler Olson to approve the HIRED recommendation. Seconded by Cate Smith Edlund. None opposed. Motion passed.
 - The ceremony will take place October 13 or 27 at the City Council chambers.
 - Ann DeGroot volunteered to represent the Youth Council if Tyler can't make it.
- Lutheran Social Service of MN (LSS) is close to getting their Master Contract number and will then be issued Fund Availability Notices (FANs) to serve 32 Minneapolis Youth who reside in the 55454 zip code area.
 - LSS has hired their youth employment case manager and launched their recruitment efforts this past weekend at the West Bank Athletic community event.
 - Minneapolis Employment and Training staff has been meeting regularly with LSS staff about youth program paperwork, budgets and WF1.

Tammy Dickinson on STEP-UP

- The total wages paid by STEP-UP are approximately \$2.5-\$3M.
 - \$1.5M in wages went to youth in Discovery and Explorer.
 - o The Achieve payout will probably be the same as Discovery and Explorer.
- Staff is working on evaluating how the summer went, laying out the new STEP-UP calendar, meeting with contractors, reporting to stakeholders, and researching how to show STEP-UP impact and outcomes.
- A staff goal for 2016 is to have the STEP-UP timesheets go electronic.

Pat Behrend

- Pat is working on the Minneapolis Employment and Training "Services to Adults" conference that has 100
 employment and training professionals already registered.
- Planning for the annual Teen Job Fair and Youth Worker conference will commence soon.
